A typical family-run Hong Kong restaurant that serves noodles and soup and is most famous for its beef brisket served in clear soup.

How do I get there?

You can either take a taxi, buses, or the MTR. The easiest way to get here is by MTR. All you have to do is take the Island Line to the Tin Hau Station and exit through gate A2 and you will arrive at Electric Road in no time! Or you could just hop on any tram East-bound from Central to Sau Kei Wan or West-bound the other way round!

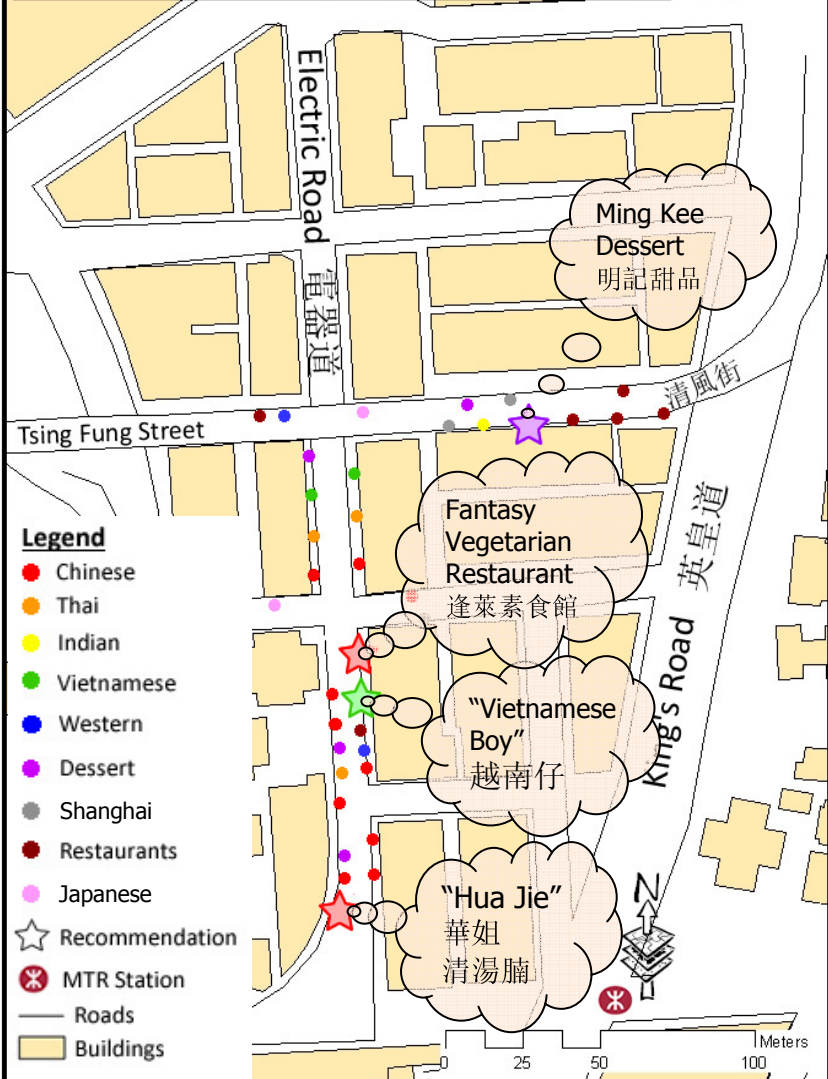
Why would I want to go there?
