Bak Gong Shrine

Make donations to temples, schools, monasteries, parks and museums.
Listen and learn; do not preach or criticize cultural practices.

What is it? A small shrine in honor of Bak Gong, a warrior who helped save many lives, and someone who many people looked up to and still do for guidance, strength and help.

Where is it? The shrine is located along the junction of Peel, Elgin and Staunton Street. Refer to the map on the back to find the locations of each of these streets to help you find your way. **(41 Staunton Street)**

How to get there? The best way is to walk up the Mid Levels escalator, get off at Staunton Street, or when you see the Staunton's wine bar and café. Get off at this junction, turn right, and walk about 200 meters until the junction of Peel, Elgin and Staunton Street. After walking, you will find a set of steep stairs on your right that lead to the Bak Gong Shrine.

Additional facts? The Bak Gong Shrine has been in Hong Kong for almost 50 years, though the exact date is not known. When taking pictures, **be sure to ask the keeper of the shrine beforehand**, who is there everyday. If you wish to make an offering to Bak Gong, you must make a small donation before using the incense.
